


2024 In Review

In 2024, we saw that the New Entrant Training course, a requirement for those wanting to start a trucking company in Manitoba, among others, was paying off. New entrants are not only more aware of their responsibilities, but evidence from Motor Carrier Enforcement shows that they are safer and more knowledgeable.

Greetings from MAPresident Pauline Wiebe Peters

We offered the Fleet Safety manager course several times throughout the year with RPM Trucking Industry Safety, as well as the Next Generation Certificate Program, a course for new and emerging leaders in the industry.

The Program and Policy Options for Recruitment, Training and Retention of Professional Truck Drivers Report was released over the summer, with the immediate action of addressing driver training standards in Manitoba.

One of our top priorities in 2024 was labour and immigration abuse. Over the last twelve months, we have raised our concerns with provincial officials. We know that administrative monetary penalties (AMPs) are being levied against these companies. The Province of Manitoba also began heavier enforcement with more stringent and clear-cut rules surrounding chameleon carriers in Manitoba. Carriers with poor safety ratings can no longer start "fresh" under a new name or with a new person helming the company. This is progress.

While the trucking industry continues to change and evolve, I am confident that, with our collective voice, we can ensure that the path forward for our industry is a good one, for all participants.







MTA Trucking Sector Council Program Chair Rachelle Baker

After a year of planning and strategizing, the MTA Trucking Sector Council Program was all hands on deck in 2024!

In the spring, we hosted the first Manitoba Trucking and Career Expo. This event highlighted the wealth of opportunities available in the trucking industry. Attendees could talk to drivers at the show and shine, and watch the truck driving championship competitors to gain an understanding of the skills needed to be a safe, professional driver.

Three courses were launched, along with the DEI (Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion) Self-Assessment and Toolkit. A career pathways quiz and job descriptions were created, and a video series featuring different driving positions has also been launched.

These resources, especially the videos and career pathways quiz, have been incredibly popular at any career fairs we have attended or presented at this year. And we have attended career fairs! From Ag Days in January to Women in Trades in November, MTA Trucking Sector Council Program staff have been all over the province, and plan to expand coverage next year.

2024 has been a great year for the MTA Trucking Sector Council Program, and I am excited for all that 2025 will bring!

2024 has been another excellent year for RPM Trucking Industry Safety. Four companies certified, and five companies re-certified in the program. We also welcomed 14 companies to the program. Anyone who has achieved Safe Work Certification through the RPM program knows it takes a team effort and dedication from employees at all levels to achieve

RPM hosted two Speaker Series events this year covering topics including WCB best practices, driver health, ergonomics, and workplace violence and harassment. RPM staff attended several conferences, including the Committee Leadership Conference and IPAM Safety Saves Conference. Two new courses were launched: Introduction to Trucking Legislation and Lock Out & Tag Out as well as the ergonomic assessment program.

Looking ahead, 2025 will be off to a great start: the finishing touches are being put on the Certified Transportation Safety Professional (CTSP) program and even more new courses are under development.

Congratulations to all RPM program participants, no matter where you are on your journey to safety. We look forward to working with you in the future!





Labour and Immigration Abuse

From the start of 2024 to the very end of the year, labour and immigration abuse was a top priority for the MTA's advocacy efforts. "Driver Inc." has emerged as a dual concern for the trucking industry, involving both tax evasion and immigration abuses. This malpractice not only tarnishes the industry's reputation but highlights systemic issues requiring collaborative solutions.



Provincially, we met with the departments of Transportation and Infrastructure, Economic Development, Investment, Trade and Natural Resources, and Labour and Immigration. We also met with Truckers Against Trafficking, and The Joy Smith Foundation to draw attention to this criminal activity in our industry.

As a result of our efforts, the Province now has a labour and immigration abuse working group to come up with solutions, including data-sharing agreements between departments to support detection and enforcement. Media coverage has drawn attention to this issue, with MTA emphasizing the impact of non-compliance on the industry and labour standards. MTA staff also met with law enforcement to raise awareness of this problem.




With the other provincial associations and Canadian Trucking Alliance, we worked as a group to draw attention to this issue across the country and at the federal level. This will continue as long as these deplorable practices continue.





Environment

The MTA is advancing environmental initiatives, including a partnership with the University of Manitoba to explore Zero Emission Vehicle Awareness (ZEVAI). The now-closed Efficient Trucking Program demonstrated significant impact, leveraging \$10.6 million in expenditures on GHG-saving devices. Current discussions with the province involve exploring alternative fuels, such as hydrogen, and creating hydrogen corridors to support emission reductions in the trucking industry.



Driver Recruitment, Training, and Retention

The Manitoba government committed to implementing recommendations from the Program and Policy Options for Recruitment, Training and Retention of Professional Truck Drivers Report. This report, commissioned by the MTA, addresses recruitment, training, and retention challenges in the trucking industry. A permanent joint steering committee will review and make recommendations on over 40 policy options to strengthen the sector's workforce and ensure its long-term health.

As a result, government will work with industry to improve governance of driver training oversight in Manitoba by ensuring the Class 1 driver training curriculum meets the needs of industry, has a continuous improvement process and improves recruitment and retention of professional drivers in Manitoba.







Government Relations – Provincial

The MTA conducted high-level meetings with provincial ministers and officials, addressing infrastructure, driver training, labour abuses, emergency pipeline repairs, and highway safety. Significant discussions included advocating for improvements to the MPI's Special Risk Extension (SRE), driver misclassification, and detecting immigration abuse in Manitoba's trucking industry. The association has also advocated for better integration of trucking needs in urban planning and support for zero emission vehicle testing to advance sustainable transportation.

MTA staff spent considerable time in the early part of 2024 building relationships and trust with new government representatives elected in October 2023. The focus of these discussions was always policy, not politics, resulting in a positive reception from many departments to our suggestions. This resulted in progress made on various files, including the Joint Steering Committee on Driver Training, improved tracking and communications of winter maintenance equipment (including what roads have been cleared), and various provincial infrastructure projects.

The MTA also met with the federal government's Privy Council Office – Multilateral Relations and Intergovernmental Affairs, to discuss interprovincial trade barriers. Many of the issues being discussed have been raised by MTA carrier members, and it is encouraging to see national policy informed by Manitoba's trucking industry.





Government relations - Municipal

MTA regularly engages with Winnipeg officials to ensure commercial goods movement is considered in the city's infrastructure plans. Key topics included the re-opening of Portage and Main to pedestrians and its implications for commercial transit, as well as economic contributions of the trucking sector. The MTA also chairs meetings of the Goods Movement Advisory Committee, an effort to align city policies with industry needs.



Road to Success: Class 1 Training Pilot Program

This pilot program, funded by The Northpine Foundation, aims to train and employ 90 individuals in the trucking sector over two years, with fully funded Class 1 training. Outreach efforts include information sessions and partnerships with carriers, schools, and agencies to secure employer sponsors and identify eligible participants. Intake opens January 2, 2025. This initiative, the largest private funding investment in the MTA's history, highlights our dedication to addressing workforce shortages and supporting career advancement opportunities in Manitoba.

MTA Trucking Sector Council Program

Workforce initiatives include organizing career fairs and launching resources like the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Toolkit. Events such as the Manitoba Trucking and Career Expo aim to address recruitment challenges, particularly for drivers and mechanics. Partnerships with organizations like Trucking HR Canada and educational institutions have provided webinars and tools to enhance recruitment, retention, and workforce diversity.

One of the keynote events for the sector council program was the inaugural Manitoba Trucking and Career Expo on June 1 at Red River Exhibition Park. This event featured a carer fair, show and shine, and the professional truck driving championship. Plans are well underway for the 2025 event on May 31.

Three self-led eLearning courses were launched this year: Canada Labour Code Part 3, Recruitment and Retention Essentials, and Essential Sales and Business Development Skills in Trucking. All of these courses can be found on the MTA website. New resources for career fairs were also launched, including a recruitment video for technicians and mechanics, a video series on various driving positions, and a career pathways quiz.

The MTA Trucking Sector Council Program also partnered with Trucking HR Canada to host Women with Drive Hits the Road in February, an event which featured a panel a discussion on the ways and benefits of recruiting traditionally under-represented groups to the trucking industry.









Infrastructure and Safety Advocacy

The MTA addressed concerns regarding the closure of the Trans-Canada Highway for repairs, advocating for minimal disruption to trucking operations. MTA staff also participated in CCMTA discussions on harmonizing carrier profiles and accident reporting.

The MTA advised Manitoba Transportation and Infrastructure on several road and bridge projects, with the aim of improving designs to meet the needs of the trucking industry. Advocacy on design, maintenance and safety reflects the MTA's support for a safer and more efficient transportation network.

Potential new drivers to our industry are now held to a higher testing standard: as of this year, anyone who fails three or more road tests is required to take more training before they can attempt the road test again.















MTA Annual General Meeting & Spring Gala

Members gathered for the 92nd Annual General Meeting of the Manitoba Trucking Association on Friday, April 12, 2024. Motions passed included the adoption of the actions of the Board of Directors, adoption of the President's Report, appointment of accountants, and adoption of the nomination committee report.

Manitoba Trucking & Career Expo

The inaugural Manitoba Trucking and Career Expo held on June 1 was a major milestone, showcasing the industry's career opportunities and celebrating the profession. With the twin purposes of informing people of the wide variety of career opportunities in Manitoba's trucking industry and advising of educational and training pathways available, this event saw over 1300 attendees stop by and check out 45 exhibitors in 52 booths, over 50 trucks in the show and shine, and watch almost forty competitors in the professional truck driving championship.

The day wrapped up with the Driver Awards Banquet, where Jasvinder Brar (Bison Transport) took home top honours from the day's Professional Truck Driving Championship in the tandem-tandem category. Brar's colleagues from Bison Transport also took first and second place in the Team award category. Sergei Linkovich (Bison Transport) was the Hal Bjornson Memorial Award recipient. Other PTDC winners were Gurinder Singh (XPO) as Top Rookie. Dave Mikkola (By's Transport) took home top honours in the Super-B category. Looking Ahead

The MTA is driving long-term initiatives, such as collaborating with government and research organizations to develop policies on interprovincial trade barriers, improved safety oversight, and new trucking technology. Regular engagement with industry leaders, government departments, and academic partners ensures a forward-looking approach to environmental, regulatory, and workforce challenges in Manitoba's trucking industry.

Driver misclassification and labour and immigration abuse in the trucking industry will continue to be priority issues for the MTA, for as long as these criminal practices are condoned. They have no place in Manitoba's trucking industry. We will continue working with the Province of Manitoba, Truckers Against Trafficking, The Joy Smith Foundation, and other organizations to raise awareness of these problems.



Looking Ahead

Road safety will also be a top priority. We will continue to provide input on infrastructure investments that ensure safety is not compromised. The perspective and needs of Manitoba's trucking industry will be shared broadly and loudly during the planning process. From winter roads, highways, rural and urban planning, there will be many opportunities for the MTA to provide input into the decision-making process.

In our efforts to ensure industry competitiveness and efficiency, we will continue to address concerns related to the MPI product line, including SRE insurance.

We will continue addressing economic development opportunities by advocating for infrastructure that makes it easy to do trade. As the keystone province and centre of North America, we will advocate for economic competitiveness for our members and the trucking industry. This includes advocating for red tape reduction.

MTA's ongoing collaboration with other trucking associations, both regional and national, strengthens its advocacy efforts. Discussions have focused on enhancing safety standards and tackling key industry issues such as training and safety regulations, ensuring a robust future for the sector.
